 2) Learn about the college admission and financial aid process

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4 Year Plan 10th Grade

STUDENTS

- 1) Buckle down keep your grades up! 2) Understand the PSAT, SAT, ACT tests and begin preparing for
- them 3) Challenge yourself with an AP Class, if appropriate 4) If you are interested in College Sports, Fine Arts or the Military Academies, you should start researching now 5) Continue visiting colleges (when possible), explore career
- options and continue being involved in activities outside the classroom

- 4) Fill out Financial Aid forms The FAFSA & CSS Profile, if required
- 5) Compare your college financial aid award letters6) Make your final decision and keep track of any
- deadlines related to registration, housing, etc.
- 7) Avoid Senioritis and keep your grades up
- 8) GRADUATE!

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Early Decision, Early Action, Regular Decision

- Early Decision => Binding Decision You apply early and the college lets you know if you are accepted early - you are bound to attend
- Early Action => Non-binding Decision You apply early and hear early but do not have to make a final decision until the Spring
- Regular Decision => You apply under regular timeline and hear from school in the Spring

- Preview the questions before you read the passage
- Start with the specific questions first

Understanding Financial Aid Essentials

 - Need Based Aid based on income & assets of the parents and student
 - Merit Aid based solely on merit of student such as scholastic, athletic, artistic, etc - regardless of parent and student income & assets

Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA)

The FAFSA is required by all colleges and universities which disburse Federal Student Aid.

- · The FAFSA is a US Dept. of Education Form
- The FAFSA calculates the Family's Expected Family Contribution (EFC) – which is the amount the family needs to pay (contribute) for their student's education
- · Go to www.fafsa.gov to file
